Claims are sentences that are used to say that whether something is true or false. There must be some degree of argument. Claims are divided into three types:

Claim of fact (involve identifying specific problems)

Greenland's ice is melting at increasing rates due to human activity.

Claim of value (involve a judgement or evaluation)

The well-being of the Arctic is more important than the mineral resources beneath the ice.

Claim of policy (involves a solution or series of competing solutions)

We should work harder to limit the causes of global warming than on extracting the Arctic's mineral wealth.

Claim of fact is defined as a counterclaim.

Claim of value is defined as a claim on behalf of another person.

Claim of policy is defined as a reinforcement to the claim.

Supporting Text: Use clear and concise language to describe the features, trends, and relationships observed in the maps. While developing a comparison essay to compare two maps, the writers usually use the future passive voice.

Data Sources and Reliability: Ensure that the maps and data used are from reliable and credible sources. Provide proper citations and references for the maps to maintain academic integrity.

Organization: Organize your writing in a logical and coherent manner.
